## TAX COLLECTION

### HOMESTEAD BENEFIT

If you are eligible to receive the Homestead Benefit the State will be applying the credit to your 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter (May) 2021 taxes. Please look for your updated tax statement in the mail. If you have questions regarding this credit please contact the State at 888-238-1233 (8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, except holidays).

### TAX BILLS

Tax bills for the Final 2021/Preliminary 2022 will be mailed in late July 2021. Bills are mailed to ALL property owners at this time each year. This bill will include payment stubs for the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> quarters of 2021 (August and November) as well as the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> quarters of 2022 (February and May). The annual mailing of bills follows the Certification of the Tax Rate by the Sussex County Board of Taxation.

### ADDRESS CHANGES

Any property owner who has had a change to their mailing address should notify the Tax office, in writing, prior to July 1, 2021 to ensure your bill is mailed to you in a timely fashion. ### NEW JERSEY PROPERTY TAX REIMBURSEMENT (PTR) SENIOR FREEZE PROGRAM

The 2020 Form PTR New Jersey Property Tax Reimbursement ("Senior Freeze") applications were mailed in late February 2021. You must file your application no later than November 1, 2021 to be considered for this reimbursement from the State of New Jersey. ## COURT NEWS

As the Spring approaches, the court continues to maintain public safety during the COVID-19 pandemic. The municipal court will continue to host remote virtual court sessions for the unforeseeable future. The following options have been offered by the State of New Jersey to better serve the public. If you are disputing a traffic ticket and do not wish to appear in court, many cases are now eligible for review through the Online Municipal Case Resolution System at [njmcdirect.com](http://njmcdirect.com). You may select the option for case dispute and enter your ticket information. Eligible traffic tickets will be reviewed by the prosecutor and you will be notified with their recommendation. Another option for certain offenses is a plea by mail. This form is available at [njcourts.gov/forms](http://njcourts.gov/forms). Please contact the court to see if your violation is eligible.

## 2021 BUDGET ANALYSIS

"The Town Council adopted the amended 2021 Municipal Budget and Capital Improvement Program, which totals \$13,408,797.

With the uncertainty of State Aid payments and the fluctuating prospects of grant funding, coupled with the reality of a tax base that has 1/3 tax exempt properties, it is an ever increasing challenge to maintain appropriate service levels and sound fiscal policies while mitigating any significant municipal tax increases. Furthermore, the Net Taxable Valuation (NVT) for the Town decreased by \$772,965. This makes it even more challenging to manage the fiscal affairs of the municipal organization, but it is a nominal amount considering we are still dealing with the greatest health crisis (COVID-19) in the United States in 100 years, and the fiscal impacts of the same.

Additionally, the new average residential property assessment has gone up slightly from the 2020 level of \$185,150 to the new 2021 level of \$185,221. Therefore, factoring in the budget and tax levy as proposed, the municipal taxes on an average residential property are estimated to go from \$2,767 in 2020 to \$2,779 in 2021 – an increase of only \$1 a month. This excellent budgetary performance is in large credit due to the excellent work performed by all staff members, professionals, and volunteers day in and day out, and they should be commended for being excellent stewards of both the public funds and public trust. I am proud of their work on this budget and thank everyone for their efforts.

The Town maintains independent financial records for the Water and Sewer fund. Both functions are supported by customer billings and do not require property tax revenues to meet financial obligations.

The Water and Sewer budget is proposed at \$4,781,629 for the 2021 year. The Water and Sewer budget provides service to 2,709 accounts. The current rate structure continues to allow the Town to reserve funds for future capital upgrades and the retirement of existing debt. Most importantly, it allows the Town to intelligently use the most fiscally conservative approach available to budgeting as it relates to necessary infrastructure improvements.

In closing, it is my belief the budget appropriations and revenue projections, as contained in the 2021 budget for Newton, and as of this writing, will enable the Town to meet the public's demand and need for critical services. Furthermore, the budget is structured as a fiscally responsible document to ensure the financial well-being of our municipal government is preserved. This 2021 budget as presented will enable the municipal organization to continue mission achievement – achieving the excellence in governance expected by our customers: the taxpayers, businesses, and residents of Newton."




**FISHING PERMITS:**

Permits are \$20.00 and \$15.00 for Seniors (age 62+).



**TOWN-WIDE GARAGE SALE:**

This year, the Town will hold their annual **Town-Wide Garage Sale** on **August 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup>**. Permits are required at a cost of **\$15.00** (for all three days). Applications will be available at the Town Clerk's Office, 39 Trinity Street.

**In order to be placed on the map, the deadline for applications is Friday, July 30<sup>th</sup>.** Maps will be available at the Town Clerk's Office and in the lobby of the Police Station.



# WATER AND SEWER UTILITY

## Want to lower your water/sewer bills?

- **Check your toilets.** A toilet that continuously runs after being flushed is the most common reason for elevated usage on a water bill. If the bill is high, this should be the first thing to consider.
- **Check your readings regularly and keep a log of the readings.** It is possible to have a water leak and not actually see or hear water leaking.
- **Take a look at the actual meter *inside the premises*.** If water is not running, the red dial on the meter should be still. If it is moving even slightly, it could indicate a leak.
- **Pay by the due date stamped on the bill.** There is no grace period on water/sewer payments. Payment must be *received* by the due date stamped on the bill or 10% will be added to the balance. If you are mailing your water/sewer payment, be sure to send it early enough to arrive by the due date.





## ZONING REMINDER

The Town of Newton Zoning Officer, Katherine Citterbart, would like to remind residents zoning permits are required for *FENCES & RETAINING WALLS, SHEDS, POOLS (including blue temporary), DECKS, EMERGENCY STANDBY GENERATORS (§ 320-34), ADA RAMPS, ADDITIONS, ALTERATIONS, TEMPORARY STORAGE CONTAINER (P.O.D.), and CHICKEN COOPS (§ 320-28.J).*

### **SURVEY:**

A property survey must be submitted along with most Zoning Permit Applications. For more details, see §320-23.E(2) of the Code Book.




### **PARKING:**

Per Ordinance 2020-19, the parking of vehicles on any area other than driveways is prohibited throughout the Town of Newton.



### **APPOINTMENTS:**

For the most efficient use of your time and ours, appointments are recommended.



### **THINKING OF EXPANDING YOUR DRIVEWAY?**

Per §320-23.E(4) the total residential area shall not exceed 50% of the dwelling footprint, plus a twelve-foot wide driveway sufficient to connect to the municipal right-of-way, or the minimum parking area which is required in order to meet the parking requirements of § 320-23, whichever is larger. (Added 9-16-2020 by Ord. No. 2020-19)

The Town of Newton Police Department became the first in Sussex County to utilize the enhanced Smart911 system designed to speed the response to emergencies. It is a free service provided by the Town of Newton to help you plan ahead for emergencies. When emergencies do occur, Newton's emergency services use the Smart911 platform to send emergency alerts to notify the public about threats to public safety and what actions may need to be taken. The Town of Newton also sends certain non-emergency alerts and public information using the same platform. # POLICE DESK

Improper disposal of medications that are no longer needed or prescribed can lead to accidental ingestion causing a risk to health. Accidental ingestion by children, the elderly, or pets can also occur. Old medications should not be flushed or put down the drain or toilet. "Project Medicine Drop" allows Town of Newton residents to drop off medicines. A secure collection box is located in the lobby of the Police Department.

**SAFE & SECURE MEDICINE DISPOSAL**

**WHAT DO I DO WITH MY UNUSED MEDICATION? Drop it off!**

Unused medications that remain in your medicine cabinet are susceptible to theft and misuse. To prevent medications from getting into the wrong hands, New Jersey's Office of the Attorney General and Division of Consumer Affairs urge you to properly dispose of your unused and unwanted prescription medicine at a nearby Project Medicine Drop location.

**DROP OFF IS SIMPLE, ANONYMOUS AND AVAILABLE 24 HOURS A DAY - 365 DAYS A YEAR, NO QUESTIONS ASKED.** Simply bring in your prescription and over-the-counter medications and discard them in an environmentally safe manner. Always scratch out the identifying information on any medicine container you are discarding.

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Traffic and pedestrian safety in Newton will continue to receive our focused attention. Reducing distracted driving and paying more attention to pedestrians is very important. By taking enforcement action when necessary and warranted, we are actively attempting to change pedestrian and motorist behavior to reduce the incidence of pedestrian crashes, injuries and fatalities in Newton.

The 'Move Over Law' requires motor vehicle operators to reduce their speed and change lanes when approaching authorized vehicles displaying emergency lights. Such vehicles include police, fire and medical services vehicles, and also highway maintenance, tow trucks and official motorist aid vehicles displaying red, blue, or amber emergency lights. Where possible, drivers are required to move over to create an empty lane next to the emergency vehicle. When safely changing lanes is not possible, drivers must slow down below the posted speed limit prior to passing emergency vehicles. Remember, emergency responders are there to help. Please give them the space they need, so they can work safely!

In strengthening public safety partnerships, one of the fundamental keys is to develop trust between the police and the community. Please remember to report your concerns when observing suspicious activity. Info-sharing regarding criminal activity can also be provided to our agency via links on social media, our website or anonymously via text message (Text tips to CRIMES (274-637) keyword NEWTON). Modern tip texting supports two-way encrypted conversations & real-time logging so that trends and incident patterns can be identified over time. The introduction of cost-effective anonymous reports - in which text messages are stripped of any identifying information before being received by police - has resulted in an increase in community involvement. In many respects, anonymous tip-texting is one of the best examples of community policing strategies at work! **However, in an emergency or to report crimes in progress, always call 9-1-1.**

COMMUNITY LAW ENFORCEMENT ADDICTION RECOVERY



A significant issue affecting our community is the opiate epidemic. Heroin and other opioids are ravaging communities across America. The reality is that one in three individuals are affected by the substance abuse disorder and addictions affects all people – no matter their occupation, income, race or status in the community. In an effort to combat the problem, Newton Police is leading the effort through involvement with the Sussex County C.L.E.A.R. program. This effort provides real therapy solutions while offering an understanding of what resources, recovery & treatment options are available.

## CRIME PREVENTION TIPS FOR PREVENTING VEHICLE BURGLARIES

Motor vehicle burglaries that occur sporadically throughout the Town of Newton and those committing these offenses are entering vehicles through unlocked car doors. As a reminder, there are several things that you can do to prevent yourself from becoming a victim.

- Take, Lock, Hide: The basic crime fighting tools to preventing burglaries to motor vehicles.
- Lock your vehicle. Yes, it takes seconds to break a window, but doing so makes noise - and criminals hate making noise. A majority of our burglaries have been to unlocked vehicles. If you leave it, LOCK IT and make sure you bring your key fob with you!
- Hide valuables from sight, or, even better, take items with you. If criminals don't see anything, they are less likely to break in, and will go to the next vehicle.
- Remember to hide valuables BEFORE you park in the place you're leaving your vehicle. If a criminal sees you put a laptop in the trunk, he'll just break into the trunk when you leave. The same advice for putting property under a seat - if a criminal sees you reaching under a seat, he'll assume something is under there and break in looking for property.
- If you see suspicious activity, call the police. Interior vehicle lights on, people lurking around vehicles, dogs barking for unknown reasons may all be indications of something amiss. If you see something, say something.

### What to do if your vehicle gets burglarized:

- Don't touch anything in or on your vehicle.
- Call the Newton Police Department, 973-383-2525 or 911 if the suspect is still on scene.
- Make your neighbors aware of the burglary and consider starting a Neighborhood Watch program.
- Remember, there is no 100% fool-proof way to prevent all crime. You can make yourself less likely to be a victim of motor vehicle burglaries by following the above tips and by using common sense. Simply locking your vehicle and removing the key fob and other property from inside is half the battle.

**Remember that YOU are an important partner in the fight against crime!!**

# PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

The Town of Newton takes pride in maintaining quality neighborhoods and a sound community environment. With warmer spring and summer months ahead consider the following:

**Trash and bulk waste disposal** - The Town provides curbside recycling. Garbage Disposal is the responsibility of the property owner(s)/tenants. When disposing of large items, such as old furniture or appliances, property owner(s)/tenants are reminded to exercise proper waste disposal practices, as described in the Newton Town Ordinances Section 250 and the International Property Maintenance Code Section 308. Residents are reminded porches and decks are not to be used to store garbage, old mattresses, recycling bins or boxes.

**Property Maintenance** - Repair/ replace elevated or damaged sidewalks that are creating a trip or other hazard. Also, clear away winter grit. Address exterior painted surfaces that are peeling, faded or unpainted. Repair damaged exterior home fixtures, such as siding, gutters, down spouts, shutters, stairs, railings and fences. Remove any exterior yard debris that may have accumulated over the winter, such as, tree branches, leaves and brush. Prepare for continual lawn maintenance and weed removal.

## BULK WASTE COLLECTION

Bulk Waste Curbside Collection will occur on Saturday, May 1, 2021. Residents will be allowed to place up to 500 lbs. of bulky items for the collection curbside. NO electronics, household garbage, recyclable material, clothing, building materials, brush/leaves/grass, hazardous materials, or tires will be collected

Permits for the 2021 Bulk Waste Collection will be available for purchase starting on April 5<sup>th</sup> at the Newton Road Department, **by appointment**. The permit cost is \$30. Additional details will be provided with the permit.
