The Reorganization meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Newton was held on the above date at 6:00 p.m. Present were Mrs. Becker, Mr. Elvidge, Mr. Flynn, Mrs. Diglio, and Town Manager, Mr. Thomas S. Russo, Jr. Mr. Ricciardo was excused.

Pastor Rev. Dr. Tom Litteer, Living Waters Fellowship, led the invocation. Mr. Russo led the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

COMMENTS BY MANAGER, COUNCIL, DEPUTY MAYOR AND MAYOR

Mr. Russo advised that Mr. Ricciardo sends his regards, as he was unable to attend this meeting and will be sworn in as Deputy Mayor on Monday, July 9th.

Mr. Russo read from a prepared statement:

“Thank you Mayor Diglio. I want to recognize my wife Trisha, daughters Ashley and Krista, and parents Thomas and Janet, for being here with me this evening. I am blessed to have their ongoing love and support.

On behalf of all Newton employees, professionals, and volunteers, I want to thank former Mayor Le Frois for her service on the Town Council and to our community. Her leadership, dedication, and commitment to excellence will surely be missed.

I want to wish Mayor Diglio and Deputy Mayor Ricciardo the best of success in their new leadership roles, and I look forward to working with them, and all of the Council, in continuing the great progress we have made towards making Newton a better place to live, work, and visit.

We have seen many great improvements here in the County Seat over the past four years, and I am grateful to this Council and previous governing bodies for allowing me the privilege of leading this organization and community.

I wish all of you the very best of health, happiness, and success, and wish the good people of Newton a very safe, memorable, and enjoyable summer. Thank you.”

Councilwoman Becker congratulated Mayor Diglio and wished her all the best in her new role as Mayor. The late Philip J. Diglio would be very proud of you, Mrs. Becker concluded.

Councilman Flynn read from a prepared statement:

“I would first like to sincerely thank the residents of Newton for affording me the opportunity to serve this great Town. Things happen for a reason and I am a firm believer in that, and I, without a doubt will live up to the challenges, responsibilities, and make the tough decisions that the people of Newton have elected me to do. I will live by the ideals that I believe in and share with many of you; that our school system remains a leader amongst its ranks, because the youth of this Town will always be our building blocks; that our infrastructure is sound, secure, and efficient; that our Town employees continue to provide services that are cutting edge and beneficial to the community in ways that leave our residents feeling proud; and that our community is safe, accessible, and inviting to all who visit it’s streets.

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We need to strongly persevere the vision of a greater economic climate for our businesses. I want to foster the entrepreneurial spirit that makes us all stronger as a community. Times are tough for everyone; residents; businesses; and local government. But we can't look past the goals and visions we have and dismiss them, because of an economy that threatens to restrain us. We need to innovate, create better and more effective ways of administering and making local government less restrictive, while maintaining the safety and level of service that we expect.

If YOU want to start a business in this Town, I don't want you to look at the Town Council as an obstacle, but rather as a friend with a helping hand. The staff and previous Newton Council have taken leaps and bounds in recent years to create an environment that breeds success and I only want to make that better, with fresh ideas and an invigorated perspective. We need to lead by example and display the full potential Newton has to offer for this County.

This microphone is always available for you to be heard, and we should hear from you, I welcome everyone's concerns, comments or criticisms, because after all, we are neighbors and we are all in this together. Thank you ALL so very much and I look forward to working for you."

Mayor Diglio read from a prepared statement:

"On behalf of myself and my fellow council members I would like to thank each of you for taking the time out of your July 4th Holiday schedule to attend this Reorganization Meeting. I am not one for long speeches so I will make this as short as possible.

Twenty years ago my husband, the late Philip J. Diglio, was elected to the Newton Town Council. He served this community proudly for 16 years as your councilman, Deputy Mayor, and Mayor. Many of you will remember him as someone who was always willing to listen. Well, I listened to him and ran for Council and I thank the residents of Newton for electing me to office and providing me the opportunity to serve them. I also thank my fellow council members for appointing me tonight as Mayor and I look forward to working with them in our efforts to continue making Newton the spotlight of Sussex County. Under our form of government the Town Council works together as a team serving the citizens of Newton. I welcome Dan Flynn to the Council and congratulate Kristi Becker on her re-election. I am grateful Joe Ricciardo will be the Deputy Mayor, and I thank Joe, Kristi, Kevin, and Former Mayor Helen Le Frois for all the guidance they have given me these past two years. I will miss Helen as she was a person who was devoted to serving the citizens of Newton. Helen, thank you for being my mentor and I wish you the best in your future endeavors.

At this point I would like to recognize Thomas S. Russo, Jr., our Town Manager, Debra Millikin, our Deputy Town Manager, Dawn Babcock, our Chief Financial Officer, Lorraine Read, our Municipal Clerk, Kerry Deckert, our Recreation Supervisor, Scott Holzhauser, the Tax Assessor, Police Chief Michael Richards, Ken Teets, from our Office of Emergency Management, Mike Teets, our Fire Chief, Rick Wahlers, LT2 and Irv Kinney from the NFAS, Ken Jaekel, our DPW Supervisor, Paul Baldwin, our Water and Sewer Supervisor, and John Madden, the Water and Sewer Operator. Also present tonight are our many professionals including our engineers, planners, auditors, general legal counsel, labor legal counsel, and bond counsel. Thank you for attending. I would also like to recognize the many Town employees who have taken their time to be here tonight to celebrate the Reorganization. A special thank you to Terri Oswin, the Administrator Assistant, for all her work preparing for the Reorganization. I would be remiss if I did not thank the many volunteers who serve on our Boards and Committees. While the Town Council sets the guidelines, it is all of these people who work together with the Council to make Newton a better place to live on a daily basis.

Also in attendance tonight are Freeholder Director Philip Crabb, Freeholder Deputy Director Parker Space, Freeholder Richard Vohden and County Administrator John Eskilson. Thank you for being here and showing your continued support for the partnership that exists between Newton and the County of Sussex.

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Being a volunteer on the Newton First Aid Squad for over nine years I know what it is like to be on call and ready to serve the residents of this Town on a dime's notice. I want to thank all the members of the NFAS and the Newton Fire Department who give freely of their time and efforts caring for the citizens. Not only do these volunteers spend many hours on calls, they spend countless hours preparing and training. These are truly dedicated individuals. While most people run away from a disaster, they are running in to help those who could not run out.

Finally I want to thank my family and friends who have been there through the years supporting me in my many adventures. My sisters and brothers, Joan Current, Grandma Vesper, the Carlson family, Desiree and Tony Torre to name a few. Most important, I want to thank each of my children, Phil, Steve, Paul, and Charron as well as their families for standing by my side. Although Phil, my late husband, is not here, I want to recognize him for being the person that he was and always being there encouraging me, supporting me, lifting me up and loving me through the many years we were together.

During the past few years the Town has been experiencing a revitalization. This is an exciting time. The Newton Theater opened last September, and there have been many wonderful shows. The world headquarters of ThorLabs celebrated its grand opening. These two businesses are wonderful assets to the community. Several stores have also opened, and Newton has become a home to both a winter and summer Farmers' Market. Other improvements on Spring Street include upgraded parking lots, wayfinding signs, benches, and bike racks. For better protection the police have installed cameras on Spring Street, a new surveillance system at Town Hall, and now have a new Solar-powered message board. The alley ways have been paved and lighting installed to improve safety.

To help with the revitalization, the Council has passed the Tax Abatement Program for the Historic District. The Land Use Ordinances have been updated, and the Zoning Officer has been given authority to streamline certain improvements as long as codes are being met. The environmental work has been completed at the Armory and the Town is moving forward with purchasing the building. Just recently we declared that property and the adjacent Shoprite property an area of redevelopment. The Paterson Avenue Redevelopment Area was amended to allow both residential and light industrial and is almost completely occupied. The Martorana Project with plans for 54 upscale Town Homes to be located behind Quick Chek is progressing. Water mains are being replaced and the roads are being paved throughout the Town as part of our regular maintenance. The DPW and the Water and Sewer workers need to be recognized for their work on Merriam Avenue, Moran, and Maple saving the Town hundreds of thousands of dollars. I would also like to thank them for their diligence in repairing the 16" water main this past weekend while causing the least amount of disruption and inconvenience to the residents. Congratulations on a job well done.

The Town is working in conjunction with the County of Sussex and Morris County Improvement Authority to place solar panels at the Water Treatment Plant and the Department of Public Works at no cost to the taxpayers. Solar Panels will also be located at the Newton High School and Merriam Avenue School. Through cooperative pricing the Town has also realized savings on both Natural gas and Electricity. Shared Services have contributed to a more efficiently run government: Animal Control with Wantage, Fire Prevention with the County, Construction with Hardyston, joint projects between Newton and Andover DPW departments, and we now dispatch for nine other communities. The savings which have resulted from the above actions in conjunction with other areas of reduction have allowed the Council to approve a 2012 fiscal budget with the lowest increase in property taxes in ten years.

As a child, my parents taught me the importance of helping others. This is a lesson I have carried throughout my life and I plan on continuing to do just that as I find a great deal of satisfaction in giving rather than receiving. Many of you know I have been involved in our community since I arrived back in the late seventies. I fell in love with the Town and I am proud to call it my home. As your Mayor I will continue to stay active in Town activities, the NFAS, GNCC, and the many events sponsored by both the Town and the GNCC including Newton Day, the Holiday Parade, Memorial Day Parade, and The Taste of Newton, to name just a few. I strongly encourage others to

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take part as well. For the last two years in April the Town has sponsored the "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" event and many people participated. I admit the days were hot and we worked hard, but a good time was had by all. This Fall the Newton Fire Department will be hosting the County Fireman's Parade and I hope to see all of you there.

As your Mayor I will continue to work with the Council in an effort to attain a Community Center which is one of my goals. I would also like to continue our efforts in keeping tax increases at a minimum while still providing the services which the Town's people have become accustomed to. I will maintain an open door policy and I welcome your comments and suggestions. I strongly believe in listening to the public as it is the public that I serve.

In conclusion I would again like to thank all of you for taking part in the Reorganization."

RESOLUTION #132-2012*

REAFFIRM BANKS AS DEPOSITORIES

BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Council of the Town of Newton that the following policy is hereby reaffirmed pertaining to Town funds for calendar year 2012:

- 1) The cash management and investment objectives for the Town of Newton include preservation of capital, adequate safekeeping of assets, maintenance of liquidity to meet operating needs, diversification of the Town's portfolio to minimize risks associated with individual investments, and investment of assets in accordance with State and Federal laws and regulations.
- 2) The following banks are hereby authorized to be used as depositories for Town funds:

PNC Bank
Bank of New York Mellon (Chase)
New Jersey Cash Management Fund
Sussex Bank
Lakeland Bank
First Hope Bank
Sovereign Bank
TD Bank
Highland State Bank
Valley National Bank

The above designated official depositories are required to file the Governmental Unit Deposit Protection Act Notification of Eligibility (GUDPA) with the Department of Banking each June 30th and December 31st every year. Effective September 30, 2011 the Chief Financial Officer can obtain this semi-annual copy of the GUDPA from the website www.state.nj.us/dobi/division_banking/depositories/gudpa.htm.

The above designated official depositories are required to submit to the Chief Financial Officer a copy of the institution's "Annual Report" each year.

- 3) All funds shall be deposited within 48 hours of receipt, in accordance with

N.J.S.A. 40A:5-15.

The Chief Financial Officer shall minimize the possibility of idle cash accumulating in accounts by assuring that the amounts in excess of negotiated compensating balances are kept in interest bearing accounts or promptly swept into the investment portfolio.

The method of calculating banking fees and compensating balances shall be reviewed on a monthly basis.

Investment decisions shall be guided by the cash flow projections prepared by the Chief Financial Officer.

4) Permissible investments for the Town of Newton shall include a) Bonds or other obligations of the United States of America or obligations guaranteed by the United States of America; b) government money market mutual funds; c) any Federal agency or instrumentality obligation authorized by Congress that matures within 397 days from the date of purchase and has a fixed rate of interest not dependent on any index or external factors; d) Bonds or other obligations of the local unit or school districts of which the local unit is a part; e) any other obligations with maturities not exceeding 397 days, as permitted by the Division of Investments; f) local government investment pools; g) New Jersey State Cash Management Fund; and h) repurchase agreements of fully collateralized securities.

5) The Chief Financial Officer is authorized and directed to make investments on behalf of the Town of Newton. All investment decisions shall be consistent with this plan and all appropriate regulatory constraints.

6) Securities purchased on behalf of the Town of Newton shall be delivered electronically or physically to the Town's custodial bank, which shall maintain custodial and/or safekeeping accounts for such securities on behalf of the Town.

7) The Chief Financial Officer shall report to the Town Council all purchases of investments in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:5-15.2.

8) The Cash Management Plan shall be subject to annual audit conducted pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:5-14.

9) The Chief Financial Officer shall escheat to the State of New Jersey checks which remain outstanding for twelve or more months after the date of issuance.
